Section 28.00—California Energy Commission—Resilient and Efficient Codes Implementation Project

Pursuant to the provisions of Section 28.00, Budget Act of 2023, the following report is respectfully submitted.

The Department of Finance has received the attached section 28.00 application from the California Energy Commission (CEC) to augment its federal expenditure authority for fiscal year 2023-24 for the Resilient and Efficient Codes Implementation (RECI) Project. Under this project, the CEC will utilize federal funds to improve code enforcement and compliance with California's Building Energy Efficiency Standards (CA Energy Code) through the following efforts:

- Meeting with local partners to understand their workflow processes, enforcement challenges, and their needs to better enforce the code.
- Surveying existing systems used by local authorities and evaluating areas of compliance.
- Deploying software to interested parties to test the impact on compliance outcomes as well as the comparative burden on users. The software will help to identify how the designs and plans comply with the 2022 CA Energy Code and where they do not.

The CEC's existing expenditure authority for 2023-24 is \$30,304,000. The CEC received notice of an increased federal award for the RECI Project on September 19, 2023, for \$2,250,000 and submitted the budget revision to the Department of Finance on November 22, 2023. Factors contributing to this delayed letter include efforts related to developing the 2024-25 Governor's Budget. The CEC requests an augmentation of its federal expenditure authority for a total of \$32,554,000 in 2023-24 for encumbrance or expenditure until June 30, 2028.

This request meets the following criteria, as required in subdivision (b) of Section 28.00:

• The funds will be expended for a purpose consistent with state law.

• The funds are made available to the state under conditions permitting their use only for the specified purpose, and the additional expenditure proposed would apply to this specified funding purpose.

Finance concurs with the necessity of this change to the approved budget and will be approving the Section 28.00 application no sooner than 30 days from the above date.

PART A: For what purpose will the funds be expended?

These funds will be expended in support of the federal Building Codes Implementation for Efficiency and Resilience program under the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA). The program seeks to enable sustained, costeffective implementation of updated building energy codes to save customers money on their energy bills. With the funding, CEC will pursue a demonstration of the innovative CodeCycle compliance software with authorities having jurisdiction, and outreach, planning, and scoping for development of the commission compliance document repository, an electronic database that will store compliance documents and data and provide CEC with valuable information to allow for better CEC oversight of energy code compliance processes.

PART B: Explain the need to expend the funds in the current fiscal year, including the consequence of waiting until budget year to expend the funds:

The federal Department of Energy signed the award in late September 2023. CEC seeks to accelerate the use of these federal funds.

TITLE:

DIGITAL INFRASTRUCTURE TO SUPPORT ENERGY CODE COMP **STATUTORY AUTHORITY:** (state, federal, as appropriate) Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, Public Law 117-58

DESCRIPTION:

The project will focus on improving code enforcement and compliance with California's Building Energy Efficiency Standards (CA Energy Code). The California Energy Commission (CEC) seeks to achieve this by implementing strategies to digitize and automate the compliance and documentation process. The project objectives are: 1) Authorities Having Jurisdiction (AHJ) Outreach and Engagement.

The CEC will meet with AHJs to recruit AHJ partners for the proof of concept for digital tools. The CEC will also provide outreach and training on CA Energy Code compliance. The goal is to interact with AHJs to understand their workflow processes, enforcement challenges, and their needs to better enforce the code. The CEC will survey existing systems used by AHJs and evaluate areas of compliance and process benefits for new software tools. 2) Proof of Concept for Digital Tools.

The Resilient and Efficient Codes Implementation (RECI) project will deploy the CodeCycle Software to interested AHJs to test the impact on compliance outcomes as well as the comparative burden on users. The CodeCycle Software uses map-based visuals; automated regulatory analysis; prioritized questions; and a refined interface. The software also generates required compliance documents ("certificates"). The software will help to identify how the designs and plans comply with the 2022 CA Energy Code and where it does not. The goal is to demonstrate the technical advantage of using digital tools such as CodeCycle, prove the value of these tools in the AHJ enforcement process, and increase the interest and adoption of these digital tools.

JUSTIFICATION:

Explanation of Exceeding 45-day Notification Period

• The agreement was signed on 9/19/23, and CEC alerted DOF that this award was made on September 27, 2023.

• CEC submitted the budget revision to DOF on 11/22/23. Factors that contributed to the delay include efforts related to the development of the 2024-25 Governor's Budget, such as 2022-23 reconciliation and discussions about budget adjustments.

Elaboration on Match Funding Required

• This opportunity requires a total of \$444,694 in match funding. CEC anticipates that subrecipients will contribute \$180,000 in match funding, and the remaining \$264,694 will come from CEC's existing budget.
